

## Systems Approach for Better Education Results (SABER) Engaging the Private Sector (EPS)

comprehensive approach that assesses policy intent, implementation, and markets for school services to address issues of access, quality, and equity to promote learning for all children and youth



- Ensuring schools are accountable for outputs and outcomes
- Setting standards and conducting student assessments and school inspections
- Outlining sanctions and rewards for schools
- Ensuring parents are given information on school quality
- Supporting agency and voice
  - Prohibiting selection of students based on academic ability or socioeconomic background
- Promoting diversity of supply
- Encouraging market entry by different providers
- Guaranteeing funding (amount and timeliness) for government supported private schools

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### Increase in Private Schools Kasoa, Ghana




### Public and Private Schools Kasoa, Ghana

Pupil-teacher ratio	25 : 1	12:1




### Affordability Kasoa, Ghana

The majority of private schools in Kasoa may not be affordable to the poorest, especially at higher levels of education

#### Only 9 percent of private schools in Kasoa are low-cost\*

Household income as a share of school costs, private and public schools







## Challenge of Data Availability in Kasoa, Ghana

Imbalance between school accountability and autonomy Insufficient
data on the
quality of
services, school
choice
decisions, etc.

Hindering development of effective policies and regulations

Obstacles for holding schools accountable



## Challenge of Information Availability in Kasoa, Ghana

#### Parents and students

- No policy guaranteeing access to standardized exam results or school inspection reports
- Parents not interviewed as part of the inspection process



Obstacles for empowering parents, students, and communities

#### School providers

- Operating requirements more restrictive in practice than in policy
- Operational guidelines not publicly available; only available by request



Obstacles for promoting diversity of supply



## Challenge of Cost Efficiency in Kasoa, Ghana

Low levels of accountability and lack of data on what works

Inefficient allocation of resources with a need to improve targeting to the poor

FISCAL PRESSURE

Current budget deficit with pressure to raise education quality

Plans to increase access by building 200 upper secondary schools
